Rector Sabbatical Update

Last fall the Vestry designated money for the Rector's Sabbatical, due every seven years, according to the Covenant of Call, the letter of agreement between clergy, bishop, and congregations. I qualified for fourteen weeks of sabbatical when we set the process, which I determined I'd take over the course of a couple of years, instead of all at once.

A good sabbatical includes a couple of criteria: time for clergy renewal, time for clergy rest, and the opportunity to bring back new ideas to help advance the parish's mission. In thinking about what kind of sabbatical would be useful for me and for Christ Church I began to explore options for learning about intercultural competency. There are a couple of factors informing that option, including the fact that we are in a Dearborn, which is a multicultural city in the midst of a multicultural region. We are in the midst of an historic Black city in a town with historic racial tension, whose population is now 42% Arabic. We are a congregation with working class, middle class, and upper-class members. We have families from Liberia, England, and Poland as well as those who have been in Dearborn for generations. Although we are a predominantly heterosexual congregation we have LGBTQ members. We are, just within our own congregation, a reflection of the diverse world we live in. Increasing our capacity for intercultural awareness will help us navigate our common life as people of faith in ways that more closely following the teachings of Jesus, who taught us to love God and to love others as ourselves.

I have found two really helpful avenues to learn about intercultural awareness. The first was the course I took last November to become a licensed Qualified Administrator (QA) of the IDI. The IDI is a world renowned intercultural inventory that assess one's intercultural competency in a highly scientific manner. As a licensed QA I can administer the tool to individuals and groups. At some point we at Christ Church will take the inventory and assess our intercultural competency as a congregation, as a vestry, and a few select people can learn their individual intercultural competency. It costs \$18 per person to take the inventory. I have applied for a diocesan grant for the money to take it as a congregation, if I get the funds we'll proceed. If I do not, then each person will need to pay for their own survey, with some funds provided to assist those who can't afford it. From the IDI we'll get a group report of where we are as a congregation and what we can do to increase our awareness and become for proficient and adaptable at engaging others who are different.

The second avenue is a course I took in January along with Curate Halim and Carolyn Blackmore at Bexley Seabury Sem-

inary in Chicago with The Rev. Dr. Eric Law. Eric Law is an Episcopal priest, and the author of many books on intercultural awareness and how congregations can be more effective at living together in a multicultural world. We had to read six books for this one week class: *The Wolf Shall Dwell with the Lamb; Inclusion: Making Room for Grace;* and *Holy Currencies* by Eric Law; *Radical Welcome* by Stephanie Spellers; *Transforming Communities* by Sandhya Rani Jha; and *Basic Concepts* by Milton Bennet (whose learnings and principles form the foundation for the IDI that I took in November).

The third avenue I am taking is continuing to work with Eric Law to become a trained facilitator through his Kaleidoscope Institute, so I can have access to all of his materials and utilize them effectively. This will require me to travel to Cincinnati, Ohio in March for 3.5 days, then for one day follow ups in April, May, and June. All of this will enable me to work with the Vestry, the Baptized for Life team, and others in the parish as we strive to be a relevant, vibrant congregation in the world today. These teachings may segue with Renaissance Implementation team initiatives as well.

A fourth thing I am doing, although not as sabbatical but as continuing ed, is ongoing work with Faithwalking. I have completed Faithwalking 101 and 201 and am taking 202 and 301 this winter. 202 focuses more deeply on the Eight Concepts of Family Systems Theory and helps us engage the material more effectively in our own lives. 301 is mission focused and encourages us to apply the Faithwalking teachings to becoming more missional focused in our own lives and in the life of the congregation.

Then, from all of this training I will take a few weeks of sabbatical to synthesis all that I am learning from IDI, Eric Law, and Faithwalking into a more cohesive set of skills to help me be a more effective leader and to help this parish live into our hopes and dreams for the future. This means I will take time away to read, write, and organize what I have learned and explore how it is applicable to parish ministry.

Lastly, I will take the remaining time of my sabbatical to go away and explore the world. I've always wanted to go to Scotland, the home of my ancestors, so I may do that. Or maybe I'll go to the Holy Land, or maybe I'll travel through Europe. I'll see how much money remains and how much time I have left, and go from there.

A WORD FROM OUR CURATE

The Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord to the Temple, celebrated on February 2, it is sometimes known as Candlemas or the Feast of Purification. The Feast of Presentation is one of the major feasts in the church year. The feast commemorates the presentation of Jesus at the temple by his parents Mary and Joseph "When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, the parents of Jesus brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of

turtledoves or two young pigeons." (Luke 22: 2-23), which is the time required by the purification of women in Lev 12:6-8 "When the time of her purification is completed, whether for a son or daughter, she shall bring to the priest at the entrance of the Tent of the LORD's presence a one-year-old lamb for a burnt offering and a pigeon or a dove for a sin offering."

The celebration of this feast dates to the fourth century through what came to us from the sermons of the Eastern Church Fathers, such as St. Cyril of Jerusa-

lem, and St. John Chrysostom. After the mid-6th century, Pope Gelasius I (CE 492–496) contributed to the spread of the celebration throughout Europe.

The Feast carried with it a tradition of its own, the of blessing candles. The Feast of the Presentation, also known as Candlemas, is also a day for blessing candles; the candles used in the procession on this day and the candles that will

be used throughout the liturgical year, candles to be given to the congregation after the liturgy.

The use of candles in the Christian Liturgy dates to the first century. The believers immediately saw it as a symbol of Christ, who said of himself in the Gospel of St. John, "I am the light of the world" (Jn 12: 8).

The candle symbolizes Christ in this memorial because of what Simeon said about Christ: "He is the light of the nations." (Lk 22:32) The candles in this spiritual light, which illuminates the conscience of the believers and their minds

from the divine lights.

St. Anselm (1033-1109), Archbishop of Canterbury, speaking about the mystery of this day, asks us to consider three aspects of the blessed candles. He says, "The wax of the candles signifies the virginal flesh of the Divine Infant, the wick figures His soul, and the flame His divinity."

The Book of Occasional Services (a companion volume to The Book of Common Prayer), offers several blessings specific to seasons and feast days. It does not, however, offer a blessing specific

to the Feast of the Presentation, a major feast in the liturgical year. The following prayer is found on page 54

O God, source of all light, today you revealed to the aged Simeon your light which enlightens the nations. Fill our hearts with the light of faith, that we who bear these candles may walk in the path of goodness, through Jesus Christ the Light of the World. Amen.

A NOTE FROM OUR INTERN

A couple of weeks ago, an impromptu group wound up gathering at the door of my office after the 10 am service. The topic of discussion was "Mitch's stoles." Discussion turned into a show and tell session on all the deacon stoles that I have hanging in the closet. I explained to everyone the difference between a deacon stole and a priest stole. It was a fun discussion, and brought up some great questions. As Terri discussed the Sunday after my ordination, it's been several years since a deacon has served at Christ Church (I think Mary Jane Peck was the last,) and then the deacons have been "Transitional Deacons." A transitional deacon is someone on the track to be ordained a priest. Under canon law, the person must serve as a deacon for exactly six months prior to being ordained a priest. A "Vocational Deacon" is called to remain a deacon for the entirety of their vocation. Then the question of the various colors came up, followed by a suggestion of a newsletter article on all of this.

You'll notice the various stoles that I wear are draped over my left shoulder, cross on a diagonal in the front and back, then connected or tied at my right hip, with two strips hanging down (one toward the front and one the back.) The stole worn by deacons is the most recogniza-

ble symbol of the deacon. Those in my office noticed some of the unique handmade stoles that I have such as the one that I wore at Christmas, the "children stole", or several of the stoles in various colors that I have.

Generally you will notice that colors change throughout the year following the liturgical calendar. These "liturgical colors" signify the place where we are in the church year from Advent to Pentecost.

WHITE - utilized for Christmas, Easter and other "feasts" or festival days. In addition white is also used for marriages, baptisms, funerals and certain ordinations.

PURPLE/VIOLET - Signifies penance and sacrifice - Is used for Lent and in some churches during Advent. During Lent, unbleached linen may also be used.

BLUE - Preparation and hope - Used during Advent at Christ Church and many other churches.

RED - Palm Sunday, Holy Week, the day of Pentecost, and at some ordinations.

GREEN - Used during Epiphany and the "Ordinary Time" after Pentecost.

VESTRY HAPPENINGS: FROM THE RECORDING SECRETARY

January has been a busy month for Vestry here at Christ Church; approving the 2019 budget, the Annual meeting, transitioning Vestry members and appointing the Officers of the Vestry.

Your Vestry spent the morning of January 12th, 2019 working with the Treasurer to review full year 2018 Finances and to agree and approve the 2019 budget. In summary: 2018 income was about 95% of budget (a shortfall of \$13,176). 2018 expenses were also lower than budget (by \$7,113), which resulted in a full year deficit of \$31,158. Vestry gave approval to fund the net deficit (\$20,776 – after applying cash carried over from 2017) by withdrawing from the Endowment Fund. The approved 2019 budget calls for income of \$286,513 and expenses of \$318,879 for a budgeted deficit of \$32,366. The details of 2018 income and expenses and the 2019 budget were presented by the Treasurer during the January 13th Adult Forum 13 and were also included in the 152nd Annual Report.

At the 152nd Annual Meeting on January 27th, 2019. Revd. Terri Pilarski thanked outgoing Vestry members (Carolyn Blackmore, Diana Brehob, Selia Danes and Denis Kirchoff)

for their service. The meeting nominated and approved a motion for new Vestry members as follows: Jean Angel, Darrell Donakowski, Chris Ventura (three-year terms) and Nick Bell (one year, to complete the term vacated by Dennis Kirchoff's resignation for health reasons). The first meeting of the 2019 Vestry followed the Annual Meeting and at this 'organizational' meeting Vestry agreed and approved the Officers of the Vestry as follows: Kevin Green will continue as Treasurer; Senior Warden, Nick Bell; Junior Warden, Lynn Becker; Clerk, Matt Sallman. The work of the Vestry will continue with its retreat on February 1st and 2nd, 2019.

BFL, Not NFL

You just gotta love autocorrect! I'm here to tell you about BFL (Baptized For Life) but my computer thinks that I want to tell you about NFL! Now that I have your attention, let me explain BFL.

Baptized For Life (BFL) is an initiative of Virginia Theological Seminary that received a Lily Foundation grant to help congregants deepen their sense of purpose through the concept and teachings of Baptism. Theologically, Baptism is understood as the ritual that defines one as a Christian and brings one into the Christian faith community. The Baptismal Covenant is found in the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer (page 304-305 for the Covenant). Lisa Kimball, a professor at Virginia Theological Seminary, wrote the grant that is leading the BFL program development and reached out to dioceses to find churches to participate in the program. Christ Church was invited into BFL by Vicki Hesse, Director of the Whitaker Institute, because of Halim Shukair's position as Curate and his charge by Bishop Gibbs to work with Arabic speaking Christians in the area. Although developing a relationship with Arabic Christians was the considering criteria for our invitation into the program, the BFL team at Christ Church is encouraged to pray about the project and discern how we can best deepen our discipleship as followers of Jesus and faith in God with BFL.

We are a committee of four, with Terri and Halim to guide and advise us. The criteria for being on the committee was pretty simple: two long term church members and two newer members. Currently, our committee consists of Caroline Antonuccio, Darryl Donakowski, Pete Kenney, and Stephanie Mulkern.

We have been working together since September, have had 5 meetings with our mentor, Rev. Deacon Maureen Hagen. With Maureen, we have participated in 3 webinars and are working our way through the basic materials to help us determine our project. The project will last about 5 years and will be funded through the VTS grant. Once the committee has determined a project focus, we will write a grant proposal and will receive funding to help us advance the project in the parish. Our goal is to have the project defines this spring and the grant written shortly thereafter.

In addition to our ongoing efforts with our mentor, several committee members will attend formation conferences in May of each year. Our committee members will be joined by people from the other 21 churches participating in BFL in the Episcopal Church.

Please pray for our guidance in determining a project that will impact, for the good, our church, our community, and, ultimately, our world.


